From the President's Pen

British novelist Doris Lessing in her recent Nobel Prize address decried a decreased interest in reading books among more privileged youth in the developed world while describing a yearning for books and education among people in Zimbabwe, where she grew up, even as they struggle for food and water on a daily basis. Lessing noted that our writers of the future need exposure to the written word—to books—if they are to write themselves. Several hundred budding Scripps Ranch were recently given writers opportunity to develop their expository writing skills in the Student Essay Contest, which the Friends of the Library helps sponsor each year. Although a virtual treasure trove of books, our Library is not "just" a repository for books but, through the efforts of SRFOL, also offers events for book lovers. Recently the Friends have had the privilege to play host to a popular author on humor and language and to a prize-winning journalist and coauthor of a book about building schools in the Himalayas. Our Book Discussion Group meets monthly for lively interchange with fellow readers. And the youngest members of our community are invited to entertaining monthly programs and offered incentives to keep reading during our popular Summer Reading Program. Chatting with the City Librarian

Anna Tatar, the San Diego City Librarian, is passionate about the library and its partnership with the community. Anna told me a little about the impact of technology on the library and the community. In 2000, San Diego libraries had 90 computers for public use. Today there are 760! The SR Library was in the forefront of the shift when a \$20,000 grant from the Scripps Foundation in 1993 brought our computer lab to life.

Technology and community partnerships make it possible for the library to reach more people with more services. Via the "Live Homework Help" Web site any child with a library card can get immediate help from a live instructor. Homework Help lets the tutor communicate with the student via a 'white board' on the Web site. A partnership between the SD Library, SD Unified Schools and SENTRE Partners brings Homework Help to San Diego children.

I could have talked with Anna for hours but concluded with a question: What book have you read recently that you loved? Anna talked about how much she loved "Three Cups of Tea", the 2008 "One Book, One San Diego" selection. Anna was impressed with Greg Mortenson and his mission to build schools for the children of Pakistan, to promote peace – one school at a time. We spoke for a while about this wonderful book and inspiring man. Finally we recalled the proverb that named the book: With the first cup of tea you are a stranger. The second cup of tea makes you an honored guest. The third time you share tea you become a member of the family. What a perfect way to end a delightful conversation. Thank you, Anna. Let's have tea again soon.

Ann has been passionate about sharing good books with children and instilling the love of reading in them. She has conducted hundreds of story times for preschoolers on Tuesday mornings over the years. She also conducted a children's book club for several years, and worked closely with Sandra Hoyt, Children's Program Chair for the Scripps Ranch Friends of the Library, in making the annual Summer Reading Program at this Library as well-attended and enjoyable as possible.

A native of Montgomery, Alabama, Ann completed two master's degrees (Library Science and English) before starting her career as a Librarian at Washington University in St. Louis. Her next career move was to join San Diego Public Library in the early 1960s. It was in San Diego that she met her husband, Dean Persons, and became the mother of Bret Persons. Her southern manner and speech led to the title of "Miss Ann", which suits her so well. She will be greatly missed in her role at this Library, but her legacy of developing an outstanding collection and inspiring children and parents to read and enjoy books together will continue on.

We will celebrate the 15th anniversary of this Library on March 20th, a week after the true anniversary of the opening, March 13, 1993. How many remember the thrill of entering a brand-new Library following the speeches, music, and balloons at the front entrance? Since that momentous day, this community and the Scripps Ranch Friends of the Library and the Scripps Ranch Civic Association have helped us maintain the building and its collections (and the adjoining Evans Pond) so well that I often get comments from people that this seems like a new library!

We are benefiting from the assistance of our loyal volunteers, both students and adults. You are providing needed support to the library staff. We look forward to honoring you on Saturday, May 3rd, at a Volunteer Appreciation event. We continue to have openings for volunteers so please contact me at the Library if you are interested.

What Have You Been Reading Lately?

"The Glass Castle" is Jeanette Walls' memoir of growing up in California, Arizona, and mostly West Virginia, with two very unfit parents. Her father was an alcoholic dreamer who could talk his way into a job, but never keep one. Her mother was only interested in painting. The kids scavenged for food. The family moved frequently, often "doing the skedaddle" in the middle of the night to avoid problems. Eventually, they settle in West Virginia, in the only house they could afford to buy - with one bedroom and no running water. This is an amazing story of how the family survived.

"Mozart in the Jungle: Sex, Drugs, and Classical Music" by Blair Tindall is part memoir, and part expose of the demise of classical music. It's the author's own story - starting to play the oboe in junior high school (because the instruments were giving out in alphabetical order, and by the time they got to the T's, only a few unpopular instruments were left), attending the North Carolina High School for the Performing Arts, studying and working in New York City. It's also about how funding for the arts has changed in the last twenty years, and about the struggling musicians who must try to live on part-time jobs and no benefits.
