



# The Huntington Library By Gary Letchinger

I was in Pasadena a couple of months ago, and I was interested in visiting some local cultural attractions. One of the most interesting places I found was the Huntington Library located just south of Pasadena in San Marino. The Library was founded by Henry Edwards Huntington (February 27, 1850 – May 23, 1927) and it is located on a property that was formerly a ranch that Huntington visited in his youth. He later purchased the property and lived there for the rest of his life.

Huntington made an immense fortune initially working for his uncle, Collis Huntington, in the railroad business. Later he purchased the "Yellow Car" streetcar system in Los Angeles and later developed the "Red Car" streetcar line. Eventually he operated 20 streetcar lines in the Los Angeles area and developed numerous residential subdivisions in the LA basin.

Huntington began collecting art and books from Europe and eventually purchased entire libraries. He brought all the books to his property in San Marino that eventually included his residence, art galleries, gardens, and a giant research library with many rare books. The original reading room for the Library is now a museum with an interesting collection of rare books on display in glass cases. One can see a Gutenberg Bible, a first edition of Isaac Newton's *Principia Mathematica*, and the Ellesmere Manuscript of *The Canterbury Tales* by Geoffrey Chaucer c. 1400-1405.

There is also a first edition of a book on human anatomy by Rene Descartes. (We remember Descartes for his philosophy books but the majority of Descartes' written works are on scientific topics such as human anatomy, medicine and mathematics.) There are ancient maps and atlases, original letters, diaries and manuscripts, early photographs of California and countless other treasures. Throughout the property there are drawings, paintings, sculptures, and gardens that one can see and enjoy. There is something for everyone in this library and museum.

If you are in the area and have time then you might also enjoy the Norton Simon Museum in Pasadena that has a small but wonderful collection of art works including some famous paintings that you might recognize.

Pasadena is also known for its early 20<sup>th</sup> Century Arts & Crafts architecture. One of the finest examples is the Gamble house designed by Greene & Greene. You can also take a walking tour of the neighborhood nicknamed "Bungalow Heaven" with a mix of early 20<sup>th</sup> Century houses ranging from modest to magnificent.

#### Do You Remember MA?

The earliest tributes to mothers date back to the annual spring festival the Greeks dedicated to Rhea, the mother of many deities, and to the offerings ancient Romans made to their Great Mother of Gods, Cybele. Christians celebrated this festival on the fourth Sunday in Lent in honor of Mary, mother of Christ. In England this holiday was expanded to include all mothers and was called Mothering Sunday.

In the United States, Mother's Day started nearly 150 years ago, when Anna Jarvis, an Appalachian homemaker, organized a day to raise awareness of poor health conditions in her community, a cause she believed would be best advocated by mothers. She called it Mother's Work Day. Fifteen years later, Julia Ward Howe, a Boston poet, pacifist, suffragist and author of the lyrics to the "Battle Hymn of the Republic," organized a day encouraging mothers to rally for peace, since she believed they bore the loss of human life more harshly than anyone else.

In 1914, President Woodrow Wilson made Mother's Day a national holiday to be celebrated each year on the second Sunday of May. In honor of this apparent day, let's celebrate some words that have one thing in common. They all end with the letters MA, an affectionate shortening of mother.
